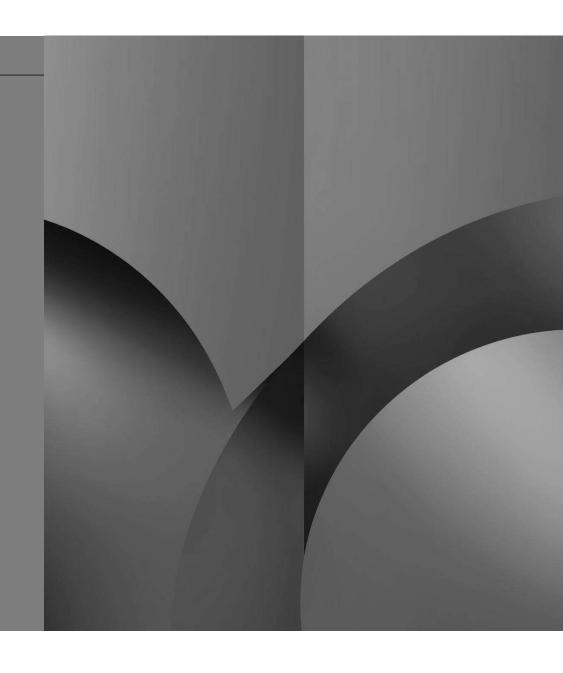

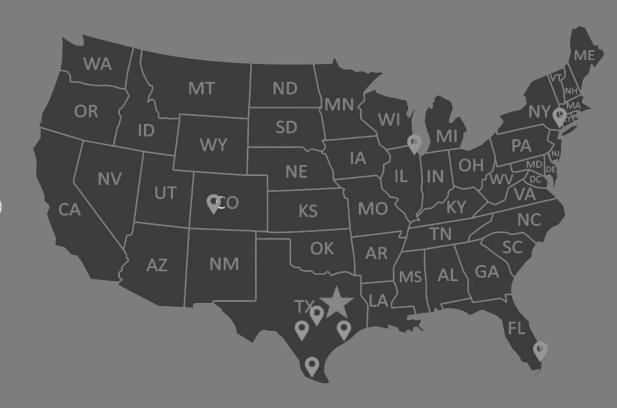

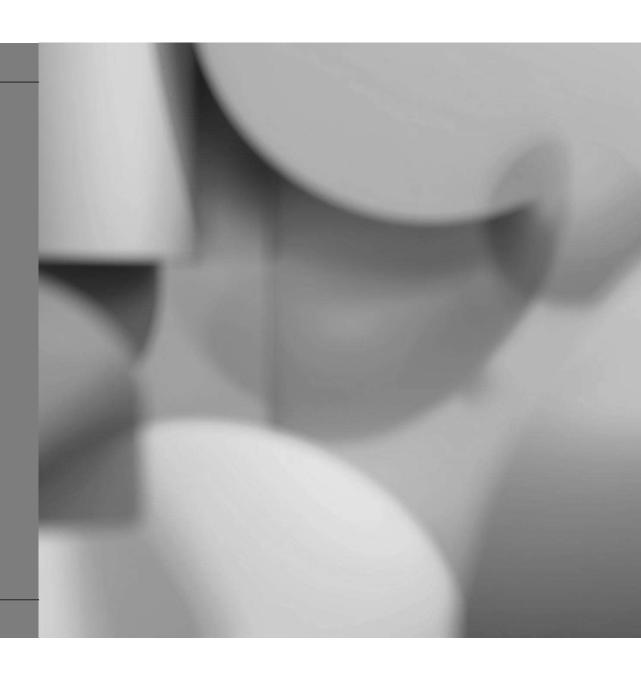

What is a Conduit Issuer?



What is a Conduit Issuer?

Conduit issuers in municipal finance are entities that issue bonds or other forms of debt securities to finance projects for third parties, typically public or private organizations.

Conduit Issuers do not use the funds raised for their own purposes; instead, they serve as intermediaries that facilitate access to capital for specific projects, primarily aimed at improving public infrastructure, education, housing, and health facilities.



Characteristics of Conduit Issuers

Understanding their vital roles and functions



Intermediary Role

Conduit issuers serve as **critical intermediaries** between investors and borrowers:

- Facilitating access to necessary capital without assuming direct financial risks.
- Their role enables various entities to finance essential projects that enhance community infrastructure and services.
- Ensuring that funds are allocated efficiently.



Tax-Exempt and Taxable Financing

Many conduit issuers have the ability to issue tax-exempt bonds:

- Making them attractive to investors seeking favorable returns.
- Helps lower borrowing costs for project developers, allowing them to allocate more resources towards improving public facilities and services beneficial to the community.
- Taxable bonds can be used when an issuance does not qualify for tax exemption.



Variety of Projects

Conduit issuers finance a diverse range of projects:

- Affordable housing
- Educational facilities
- Healthcare centers
- Water and sewer
- Public infrastructure developments



Public Purpose

The funds primarily support private entities, the underlying goal often aligns with public welfare, such as:

- Increasing access to education
- Affordable housing
- Improving public health services.

Projects Conduit Issuers can Finance

1. Affordable Housing

- Multi-family residential developments
- Single-family housing projects
- Rehabilitation and construction of low-income housing

2. Educational Facilities

- Construction and renovation of public and private schools
- Financing for colleges and universities (both nonprofit and for-profit)
- Libraries and educational support facilities

3. Healthcare Facilities

- Hospitals and medical centers
- Senior living facilities and assisted living centers
- Healthcare clinics and rehabilitation centers

4. Public Infrastructure

- Roads and transportation projects
- Water and wastewater facilities
- Energy and utility infrastructure improvements

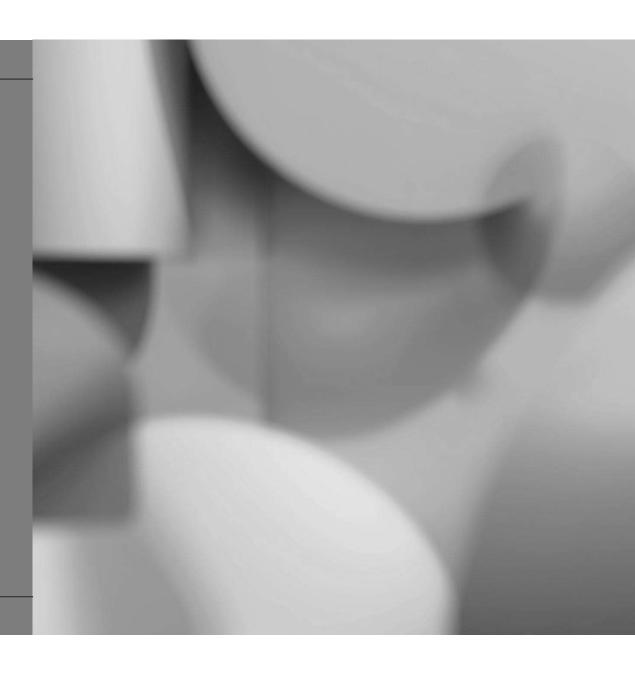

Who Can Benefit from Conduit Financing?

Government Entities

Government entities, such as state and local governments, can utilize conduit issuers to finance public infrastructure projects.

Private Developers

Private developers often collaborate Municipal authorities can access with conduit issuers to secure financing for affordable housing projects.

Municipal Authorities

Educational Institutions

Educational institutions, including public and private schools as well as colleges and universities, can work with conduit issuers to secure funding for construction, equipment acquisition.

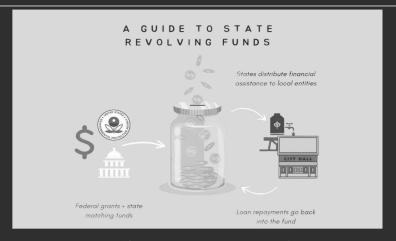

Leveraging Federal Grants through State Revolving Funds

Maximizing funding opportunities for local projects



Importance of Conduit Bonds for Funding

State Revolving Funds (SRFs) are essential mechanisms for financing water and wastewater infrastructure projects, enabling the issuance of conduit bonds to leverage federal grants. This strategy enhances capital accessibility for municipalities, allowing them to implement critical improvements while reducing costs through favorable financing terms.

SRFs often pool multiple issuers to decrease cost of issuance for each issuer.

Florida's Funding Approach to Infrastructure Projects

Low-interest SRF loans replace bond issuance

Understanding Florida's SRF Loan System

The State of Florida does not issue State Revolving Fund (SRF) bonds for water or wastewater financing. Instead, it provides lowinterest SRF loans, funded with State and Federal dollars, through the Department of Environmental Protection.

This approach allows Florida to support essential infrastructure projects efficiently while minimizing the financial burden on municipalities and communities.

Types of securities

Common Types of Securities in Conduit Financing

1. Tax-Exempt Bonds

Private Activity Bonds (PABs): These bonds fund projects that provide benefits to private entities but also serve a public purpose, such as affordable housing, education, and healthcare facilities. Interest on PABs is generally exempt from federal income tax.

2. Revenue Bonds (taxable and tax-exempt)

- Industrial Revenue Bonds (IRBs): A subset of PABs, these bonds are specifically issued to finance manufacturing facilities and other industrial projects.
- **General Revenue Bonds:** These bonds are backed by the revenue generated from specific projects, such as toll roads, bridges, or utilities. The bondholders have a claim on the revenues produced by the funded project.
- **Special Revenue Bonds:** Like general revenue bonds but typically issued for projects with more specialized revenue sources, such as hotel taxes or dedicated sales taxes.

3. Housing Revenue Bonds

• Issued specifically to finance affordable housing initiatives, these bonds often fund multi-family housing projects, single-family homeownership, aimed at low- to moderate-income individuals.

4. Health Facilities Bonds

These bonds are used to finance the construction and improvement
of healthcare facilities, including hospitals, clinics, and nursing homes,
ensuring that healthcare providers have the necessary capital to
operate effectively.

5. Educational Facility Bonds

 Conduit issuers can issue bonds specifically to fund educational institutions, including public and private schools, colleges, and universities.

6. General Obligation Bonds (least likely to be part of a conduit)

• While less common for conduit issuers, some may issue General Obligation Bonds, which are backed by the full faith and credit of the issuing entity (usually governmental).

Taxable Bonds

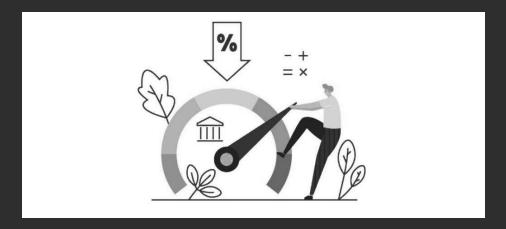
When a project does not qualify for Tax-Exempt issuance

In certain instances, conduit issuers may issue **taxable bonds** when the project does not qualify for tax-exempt status. These bonds provide necessary funding but lack the tax benefits, making them a viable option when other financing avenues are limited..

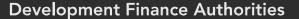

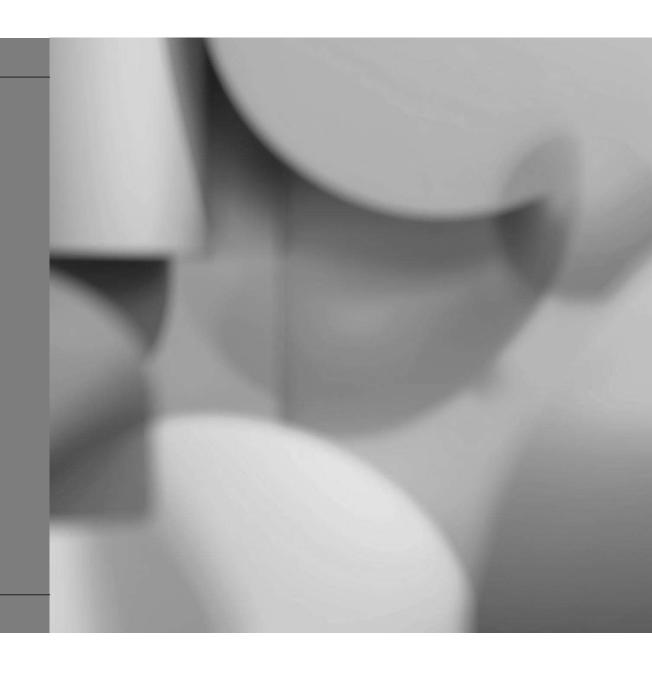

Key Takeaways

Marketing:

DASNY was pre-marketed with limited feedback from investors. Prior to release on the morning of February 27th, the markets were off a bit. The move up in treasury yield, combined with a high supply of treasury and corporate new issue bonds contributed to the decision to increase the order period to 2 hours, opposed to the typical 1 ½ hour OP from 9am to 11am CT.

Pricing:

The syndicate was able to garner significant attention from the investors and the issue had adjustments from 5-12 basis points lower on all maturities. The adjustments led to a favorable final pricing for the DASNY. Estrada Hinojosa submitted \$8.770 million in orders and was allotted \$1.200 million bonds on the

Estrada Hinojosa Deal Support:

Estrada Hinojosa asked Jefferies, the senior underwriter, to get under the unsold balances.

Estrada Hinojosa deployed \$2.280 million of the firm's capital to hold the price and ensure best execution on the deal.

Market Conditions

 Treasuries opened 2-5bps weaker on December 10th as traders prepped for the \$119bln in supply kicking off December 10th with \$58bln 3yr notes and CPI on December 11th. The US TSY 10yr which was at 4.195% on December 9th at 3pm opened at 4.238% and stayed close to that level all December 10th.

Transaction Highlights

- The book was oversubscribed by 2.18x, with 22 accounts submitting orders, and more than 20 additional accounts expressing interest during the order period.
- The final pricing was 5 basis points tighter than proposal during the initial guidance.
- The bonds were sold at a 70-basis point spread over the 10 year I-Curve, resulting in a rate of 4.885 percent.

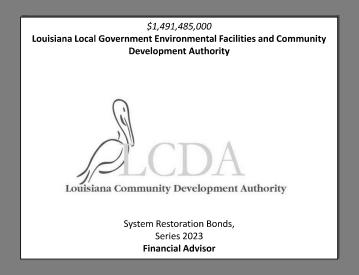

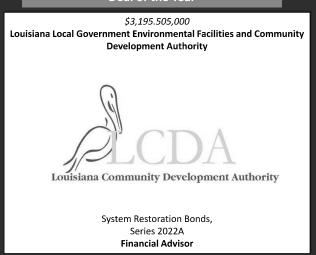

On Wednesday, May 11, 2022, Estrada Hinojosa participated in a \$3,193,505,000 Louisiana Local Government Environmental Facilities and Community Development Authority, System Restoration Bonds, Series 2022A deal as Financial Advisor to the Louisiana Public Service Commission. The issuance of the Series 2022A Bonds will finance the recoverable system restoration costs incurred to restore its facilities and service to customers following the damage caused by Hurricanes Laura, Delta, Zeta, and Ida and Winter Storm Uri and the re-establishment of the storm damage reserves. This deal was the largest municipal bond transaction in Louisiana history. The sale was accomplished notwithstanding very difficult and volatile financial markets. The overall weighted interest rate of 4.28% is approximately half of Entergy's Weighted Average Cost of Capital of 8.49%, which would have been the carrying charge to finance the storm costs via traditional utility financing. The total savings from securitization in nominal dollars are estimated at \$2.05 Billion.

Overview of Conduit Issuers in Florida

Statewide and Multi-Jurisdiction Conduit Issuers

These conduit issuers operate at a state level and can finance projects across multiple jurisdictions.



Florida Development Finance Corporation (FDFC)

The FDFC facilitates financing for diverse projects across Florida, enabling both public and private entities to access capital through various bond types.



Capital Trust Agency (CTA)

The CTA serves as an interlocal conduit issuer, financing capital projects that contribute to economic development and public infrastructure improvements.



Florida Housing Finance Corporation (FHFC)

FHFC focuses on affordable housing initiatives, issuing bonds to support multi-family developments and homeownership opportunities across the state.



Florida Local Government Finance Commission (FLGFC)

FLGFC offers a conduit program for various public projects, enhancing local infrastructure and services through efficient financing solutions.



Florida Higher Educational Facilities Financing Authority (HEFFA)

HEFFA provides financing for nonprofit colleges and universities, helping institutions meet their capital needs through tax-exempt bond issuances.



State Board of Administration and CAPFA

The State Board of Administration oversees the management of the state's investment funds, ensuring efficient allocation of resources. The Capital Projects Finance Authority (CAPFA) facilitates financing for capital projects that support economic growth and public infrastructure.

County & City Housing Finance Authorities (HFAs)

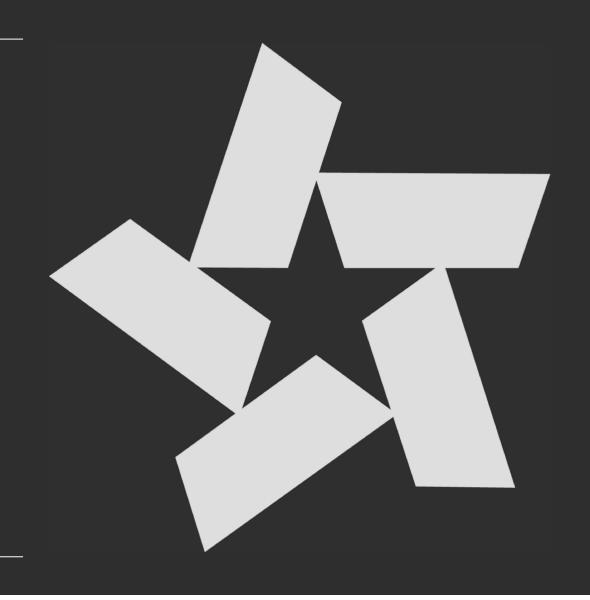
